2007 LIBRARY BUDGET VOTE and TRUSTEE ELECTION MAY 31



Our **budget vote** this year is on **Thursday, May 31**, from **noon to 8:00 pm** in both the Village Library and Rosman Center. **Registration** for the vote will be held on **May 19**, from **noon to 4 pm**, in both the Village Library and Rosman Center. **Public Hearings** are scheduled for **Wednesday, May 9**, at **8:00 pm** at Rosman Center and **Thursday, May 10**, at **8:00 pm** in the Village. Two five year term seats are available on the Board of Trustees. If you will be absent from the library district on May 31 and want an absentee ballot, please call the Library at 786-3800 ext. 14 for an Absentee Ballot Application. VILLAGE RENOVATION



The Village renovation is near completion. The painting, flooring, lighting, and plumbing are complete. We hope to have had the exterior railing finished by the time you read this bulletin. The library will have its Certificate of Occupancy so we will be able to hold the 2007-2008 Public Hearing in the Village library. The last phase of the project is the installation of library shelving,

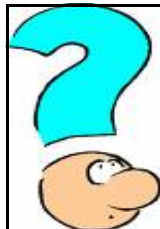
followed by shelving the library materials.

We hope to open to the public during June. A formal grand opening will be held in the fall.

The staff, Board of Trustees, and I want to thank you for your patience with the project. Although the time line is longer than we estimated, the renovation has been within the projected budget.

We are looking forward to serving you in a beautiful restored building.

Questions Asked By Our Patrons



Why are so many lights on at night? The library is required by code to have lights on all levels for emergency and safety. In January 2006 we removed light bulbs from fixtures on our upper level to conserve energy. We are reviewing the possibility of removing more bulbs on the mid and lower levels. This is a less expensive action than having the interior electrical lines reconfigured.

Why can't I pick up materials on hold for my spouse? The library complies with New York State Confidentiality of Library Records law. Spouses and/or family members can pick up hold materials if they bring the original borrower's card with them. Having the original borrower's card denotes permission. Other libraries in the County and/or in the Ramapo Catskill Library System may choose to use other options. Copies of library policies are on our website. Your neighbors who serve as trustees thank you for your continued support.

This proposed budget includes cost savings in materials, operations and miscellaneous expenses. There are no new staff positions. The increases are for utilities, New York State Retirement System contributions, and health costs. The increase is under **2%** for the total budget.

The success of adult programs continues, with an increase in attendance over last year. Adult library users attended programs ranging from driver education, book /movie series, to gardening, financial planning, cultural trips, and various craft programs. Youth Services hosted 20,368 kids at programs. We are proud that we have had over 951 teens attend special programs, an increase of 40% over last year. Our public internet stations held **33,030** sessions. We have wireless internet capability for those who bring laptops to the library. We have registered over **1,600** new library users. Our community rooms were used **60** times by organizations, including the Town Police Department, League of Women voters, Haverstraw Rotary, and others. **2,542** people used the quiet study and tutorial rooms. The library benefited from 170 hours of volunteer service. **347,547** items were checked out by users during the year. **29,565** new library materials were added to our collection this past year. Materials will continue to be purchased to meet the demands of our community. Our new automatic exterior book drop provides for faster return of materials to the shelves .

The Historic library building in the village is currently undergoing an interior renovation and replacement of exterior stairs and walkway. The building has been closed since July and will reopen in June. Despite this temporary closure we have held programs at various sites in the Village of Haverstraw. The newly renovated facility will provide program space for community organizations and groups, comfortable seating and browsing collections, internet and wireless capability. This project was funded by local tax dollars approved by voters as part of the referendum to build a new library. We also received \$144,928 in New York State Construction Grants.

In the coming fiscal year we will use monies from our fund balance to finance an equipment replacement fund and the automated check in system. Our staff will continue to be available to give you professional courteous service and provide the informational, technological, and leisure entertainment services necessary. We look forward to serving each and every member of our community. We hope we can count on you to help us provide excellence in library service.

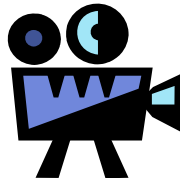

Information At Your Fingertips



We can't repeat often enough that we have many databases available for your use in the Library or at home. Please try them out or ask at the Reference desk for a librarian to show you how they work. Just last week we had a question about a dentist's educational background, and we were able to provide the answer in minutes using the ReferenceUSA database. Our databases cover many fields, from literature and business to health and current events. A bonus for those using the databases at home is the Best Online Reference Sites link at the bottom of each database access page. This link will take you to a collection of over 500 free resources chosen by librarians for their reliable content and ease of use. Remember - your library card is the smartest card in your wallet!!

Check Your Account From Home

You have on-line access to your library account from home. You can see items you have checked out, the dates they are due, items you have on hold, and any fines you may have incurred. The instructions are as follows:

1. Using an internet browser, go to www.hkdpl.org
2. In the brown box on the right side of the screen, click on "**Check Your Account**".
3. Enter the barcode number from the back of your library card in the space provided for **Barcode** or **User Name**.
4. Enter the last four digits of your phone number in the space provided for **pin**.
5. Click on "**Login**".

You can renew items from home if your account is clear and the item is renewable.

Good As New Again! The library recently acquired a machine that cleans and repairs damaged discs. We can repair most scratches and restore discs to "as new" condition, but we need you to tell us if a disc is problematic. You can do this by returning it to the circulation desk and telling the clerk the disc needs repair, or you can put a note inside the box when you return it through our automated check-in system. We have never charged a patron for returning a scratched disc, and the person who uses it after it's been restored will be grateful.
